The nonsense of the Resurrection

One of my great joys (you may consider that I lead a very sad life) is standing up in church on Easter Sunday, having told the Good Friday story of Jesus' sickeningly nasty death, to announce the unbelievable, the incredible, the downright bonkers news that "The Lord is Risen". Not as in "after a heavy night Jesus rose late and ate a hearty breakfast" but From The Dead- after three days in a torb in a very hot country. It is so obviously impossible, so clearly an implausible, ridiculous notion, so scientifically momensical, that it literally defies belief. And yet I devote my entire life to it. What kind of a gullible idict would do that? My joy comes, not just from the gobsmackingness of the news itself but from the response which comes roaring back from the congregation and from millions of similarly gullible idicts all over the planet. "He is risen indeed!" and thus we begin the celebration of the most important day of the Christian year.

There are three ways to respond to such an insane story. You can dismiss it as utter tosh and marvel that such a big lie has hoodwinked billions of people over 2000 years. Or you can realise that it is so silly that mbody would try to peddle such a laughably improbable tale unless it was true, still less die defending it (nearly all the founders of the early church died martyrs deaths attesting to the truth of what they had witnessed) if indeed it is really possible that an outrageous lie could be maintained over 2000 years! The third rational response (some might say the only rational response) is to ignore the whole thing and just enjoy the choc-fest known as Easter and dreamed up by Cadburys in collaboration with Thomton's and the Were-Rabbit's Public Relations Bureau.

But suppose it is true. So what? What significance can such a supernatural event have on the lives of the average Braunstonian, the nation, the world or the supernatural spheres of good and evil?

The answers are too big for the BVN unless the editors want a bumper Easter Annual 2012 - and I'm sure they don't. I'm even surer that you don't. So for now I'll just throw freedom, power, love, peace, contentment, hope and a chance for life after death at you. Not to mention ultimate victory over evil for all time. Yes I know. Bonkers. But worth looking into. Life changing.

Enjoy the food, the chocolate, the television, the holiday. I'll be enjoying them too. But ultimately these are not what Easter is for. Take those away - take away the ceremonies and the hymns (by which I do NOT mean don't bother to come to church on Easter Sunday!) and what we are left with is the central message of our faith. A message so central that without it there would be no Christianity.

BRAUNSTON CANAL SOCIETY - UPDATE

On Friday 16th March we had a very constructive meeting with Karen Fishwick of British Waterways, to progress our group and its future. It would seem sensible for as many members as possible to sit down and discus this and give their opinions. In order to achieve this we have booked the village hall in Braunston for an hour or so at 7.30pm on the 27th March. It would also be an opportunity to assess the capabilities of our members to ensure we do not take on tasks we are not capable of doing. It would be easier for BW, and I think for ourselves, if we came up with a work programme for either 6 or 12 months ahead. The thought is that this should be based around one workday per month. Any person who will not be able to attend the meeting but wishes to make a particular point is welcome to email or ring me before the meeting. The meeting will be open to anyone with an interest in what we are trying to do, not just those who have registered an interest. This being the case if you know of any other persons who might like to help please fetch them along.

Our first towpath tidy was very successful and the area looks better to this day. I know several people who are continuing to collect the odd item of rubbish and have extended out onto some of the footpaths adjoining the canal, for this we are grateful, we are trying to obtain our own basic equipment from BW so that it will be easier to do this for those that wish to in the future.

Our next event will be to complete the towpath tidy, that is from the junction, down the GU to the winding hole on the puddle banks and up the North Oxford as far as the second bridge below the church. This is to be on Sunday 1st April, meeting at the stop house at 10.00am. This, we hope, will provide an opportunity for those who cannot manage weekdays to join us. To make it a bit easier I will probably take my narrowboat up to the puddle banks, we can throw the bags on the roof to bring them back and for anyone who hasn't tried it yet there is a short boat trip on offer. Hopefully the weather will be a little kinder to us this time.

We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the village hall.



Children were asked to bring their lunch in re-useable containers so at lunchtime the amount of food waste from the children's lunches was weighed and compared to a normal day.

" Friday 2nd March - rubbish 141b, food waste 101b

" Friday 9th March - rubbish 81b, food waste 81b

On the 9th over 80% of children walked to school compared to the usual 44%. By walking to school they helped to reduce CO2; it is a layer of gas around the earth and is made by burning material containing carbon.



Jubilee Garden

In 1977, to commemorate the Queen's Silver Jubilee, the Braunston Village Gardens Association (BVGA) landscaped and planted a garden at the Village Hall. Although we maintained it over the years, it had become very tired.

Last year, when extending the Hall for the pre-school, the builders had to flatten most of the garden to get access for their machinery etc. On completion of the project, they rebuilt the wall and partially reinstated the area. Last autum, with the help of money from the builders and the Parish Council, the BVGA members re-landscaped the area and started re-planting.

This year, to Commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, the Royal Horticultural Society is launching an 'In Bloom' celebration by distributing wild flower seeds to registered groups. As an Affiliated Society, the BVCA has registered and we will be sowing the seeds on Sunday 15th April starting at 10am. We hope that villagers will come along to the Village Hall to help sow the seeds.

We are hoping that the flowers will provide a good display in the summer and will attract plenty of insects - butterflies, bees and hoverflies. We will be recording which insect visit and would appreciate help with this too.

Anyone connected in any way with the canal and its history in Braunston , can not have been dismayed at the state of affairs concerning the Admiral Nelson Rub in Dark Lane. Over the past 4 years it has had as many landlords. The pattern has been a regular depressing tale of opening just before Easter and closing 8-12 months later. On the face of it the location has everything going for it. Rural setting, canal side with no through road, plenty of parking and outside seating with a large restaurant but sadly no one seems to have been able to make a go of it, that is hepefully until now.

A recent spate of activity with what appears to be more than a spring clean means that all being well the new Licensee's, Mark and Pam Davis together with their chef trained son, Liam, will be reopening in time for Easter. Having met Mark and Liam this afternoon it is clear that they are passionate about turning this historical canal side pub into a success.

The formula that they hope to be a winner is a simple one, catering for those who enjoy fresh well-cocked food but at a price that won't hurt the wallet. They plan 2 menus and this will reflect Liam's passion for food. For those who don't want a full meal, lighter options will be available I am told and the beer selection, Mark assured me will not disappoint! As Mark pointed out, they are intending to be in the Nelson for the long haul and he and his family look forward to welcoming villagers and visitors alike.

The canal needs this pub to succeed and in what promises to be a very challenging year ahead with the locks shut between 4pm and 9am lets hope they can succeed where other's have not. As with most village services the pub is still an important hub of the community, it's a case of use it or locse it. The exact date for the Admiral Nelson to reopen has yet to be determined but all being well the opportunity to partake in a pint and pie will not be far off.

SOLITARY BEES

In order for crops to prosper, be it in the garden, allotment or farm, it is critical that the blossom and flowers are pollinated at the start of the season. We all have seen the Bumble Bees and Honey Bees going about their business but less of us will have noticed the various bees grouped together as Solitary Bees. These include various types including masonry and leaf cutters, and they all lead solitary lives. The female mates early in the year and then spends her life collecting pollen, this she places in a tube shaped nest, one egg, a plug of pollen then a cap - mud in the case of masonry bees. She will continue this process till that tube is full, and then find another site to continue the process.

These bees are not adapted to hives or groups, they never therefore swarm or sting people. All their production comes from pollinating plants and is to feed next years young. They are very industrious and are very important to our lives and our food chain. The Masonry Bees are usually the first about, late April into May.

It is easy to create a suitable nesting site using bamboo canes, this will give you the opportunity to watch the bees at work. They are totally safe for children and older people to watch up close. The Leaf Cutters which come later are particularly interesting to watch as they separate each egg with a section of leaf that you can watch them trim to shape.

Two boxes for Solitary Bees have been installed in the Jetty Fields garden at the top of the site on the left, Hopefully the bees will be active soon and people will be able to watch the process.

The 200 Club organisers have tried without success to locate a 200 Club prize winner. Only his forenames appear on the Village Hall Bank Statement.

Bells have nung in Braunston for a long time. A survey of 1552 states that there were four bells in the tower and a sanctus bell; the latter, usually a small bell, was sounded during the Communion Service.

In 1672 these four bells were recast into a ring of six by a Woodstock bellfounder. This recasting cannot have been very satisfactory because the third bell was later recast, probably by one of the Bagley family of bellfounders at Chacombe. Then in 1811 (not a long time for bells) the entire ring was again recast by John Bryant of Hertford, a founder of considerable repute, and these still serve us today, 200 years later.

It is probable that these bells were transported by canal from Hertford; if so, the last half mile must have been the hardest part of the journey!

In 1849 the bells were rehung in the new church, apparently using the same wooden frame (which had cost us f60) and remained so until 1922 when they were returned and rehung in an all metal frame with modern

fittings, notably ball bearings which greatly reduced the effort of ringing. The total cost of this operation was £484; one wonders whether today this would have covered the cost of transport to and from Lougborough! The kneeling stool, made from the timber of the old bell frame is the only reminder we have of the earlier installation. (Thanks to John Caunt for this information.)

So, when you hear the bells ring, reflect that this same metal, with some extra metal added, has been sounding out over the village for several hundred years. P.D.W.

BRAUNSTON WALKERS

Walk Saturday 1703012

Around Stanford Hall c.10.5 miles

This walk is packed with historical interest, crosses three major roads, two counties and follows Shakespeare's River Avon. We visit two Motte and Baileys or should it be two Mottes and Baileys? Also we pass by the beautiful old stately home, one of two stately homes called Stanford, the ancestral home of the Cave family built in the 1690s, a wonderful example of William and Mary period architecture. Fifteen of us set off to drive to Catthorpe with rain that was forecasted not materializing. Really good news for our group as this would have been our 3rd walk in 2012 with rain!! We started off with a fascinating walk through the church yard and spotted many east European names on the old gravestones. Our path out of the village went over wet fields of evil school dinner cabbage smelling Rape, across a disused railway and over the River Avon to reach the church at Lillbourne with an impressive double Motte and Bailey in the adjoining field. We had a quick walk over the old fortification speculating as to why there were two Mottes, sucked on boiled sweets supplied by Nigel and Terry and then followed the road under the roaring ML along a bridle way and over fields until we again reached the old dismantled railway. We turned left on a tree lined path alongside the busy A14 to reach the bridge where the Avon flows under the road. Our path followed the river and then branched right over lush sheep field meadows before regaining the dismantled railway embankment which we followed. There are a number of small brick railway buildings along the track including one with the remains of an old cast iron stove. Leaving the railway our track passed by a farm with original railway station platform and canopy to emerge on a small road which winds past some fabulous thatched houses which were built on estate land in 1929. This is Stanford on Avon and the road continues up to the magnificent church which has a square tower with four imposing pinnacles. It also houses an organ with some of the oldest pipes in England but by now there was an irresistible, gravitional, pull of the pub stop. We passed a memorial in a field opposite the hall to Percy Pilcher who died in a gliding accident in 1899. He had built a powered aircraft but had broken the crankshaft on the day he died and had reverted to his Hawk glider. It has since been proven that his powered machine was capable of flight and would have predated those pesky, American, Wright Brothers by 4 years with the first powered flight. Drat! We crossed the Avon on a bridge marking the county boundary of Leicestershire and Northamptonshire then turned left on a bridle way leading around the hall grounds. We wearily climbed a stile on the left and followed field paths back to Swinford and our lunch stop at The Chequers. The Adnams beer and proper, thick cut, ham sandwiches (none of that wafer thin nubbish that they advertise as if it's a virtue!!!) with tasty chips went down really well and is highly recommended.

After a walk around Swinford churchyard with graves dating back to 1698, lots of dreadful consumption deaths, we left the village on the road towards Shawell and then took a field path off right over a sloping meadow, past a spring and the imposing Swinford Lodge to reach a path numning alongside the busy ML. We crossed the motorway on a footbridge bridleway and then turned right over fields to reach Shawell. Leicestershire County Council had been busily painting the footpath posts in a lairy, Del Boy, yellow which we kept getting on our hands. We expected to catch up the mystery painter as they had only just been freshly painted. We walked through Shawell with its old hall and church pausing by another old motte and bailey then followed the path to reach the road back to Gatthoupe and crossing below the busy M6 before branching right over a steeply rising meadow to get back to the cars and home for a welcome cuppa! An excellent and historical walk.

Why not come and join us on our future walks normally meeting at 10 at the village hall on the third Saturday in the month:

21st April Chipping Warden (c.10 miles) 19th May The Malvern Hills (c.11 miles) 16th June Ellastone and the River Dove (c.11 m) Advance notice of a big graveyard clean-up! (June 2012)

I have received various complaints that the cemetery is looking scruffy and disrespectful. Several people have suggested that rather than being a beautiful, sacred and peaceful place for Braunston's dead it is messy and gnubby-looking. Some of this is, of course, about maintenance and the church council (PCC) will be working out how to get rid of the huge mound of clay soil near the gate and dispose of fallen and out foliage, currently in piles after a recent pruning exercise.

However some of the problem relates to the decoration of graves. Artificial flowers very quickly become grubby and grotty - which is why diocesan regulations specifically prohibit them in churchyards. I know that this has not been well publicised by the church in recent years and I apologise for that - we'll get a clear notice up in due course. There are also some items such as, toys, statues, balloons and so on which may help mourners just after a funeral but which rapidly become tatty and inappropriate.

The churchwardens and I would like to tidy up and restore the cemetery to a sacred, respectful place of rest for all our loved ones. Realising that some items on graves may be of real sentimental importance we are giving two full months notice so that families can have a chance to collect them before a churchyard working party clears them away in June. If you are unable to get there to remove them yourself but want the items back please let me know and we can retrieve them for you.

Nothing looks as beautiful and natural on a grave than real plants and flowers and some families have done a beautiful job of planting bulbs and shrubs. If you would like help in doing this then please ask. Bulbs, bedding plants, dwarf roses, small shrubs and the like are inexpensive and can be a sturning tribute to the deceased. I look forward to working with you to making our church burial ground as beautiful as it can be.
